

**OPEN FIRE PROHIBITION
BLACK HILLS NATIONAL FOREST
WITHIN STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA
(Black Hills Fire Protection District)**

Pursuant to 16 U.S.C. § 551, and 36 C.F.R. § 261.50(a), the following acts are prohibited on all National Forest System lands administered by the Black Hills National Forest within the State of South Dakota. This Order shall be in effect until rescinded, or until December 31, 2012, whichever event occurs first.

PROHIBITIONS:

1. To the extent not authorized by the Exemptions below, violating any provision of South Dakota Statutes §§ 34-35-15, 34-35-16 and/or 34-35-17, which prohibit open fires in the Black Hills Fire Protection District, copies of which statutes are attached and hereby incorporated into this Order as Exhibit A. 36 C.F.R. § 261.52(k).


South Dakota State Law defines "open fires" as any fire to burn slash, brush, grass, stubble, debris, rubbish, or other inflammable material not enclosed in a stove, spark proof incinerator, or an established fireplace approved or constructed by public agencies in designated recreation areas.

EXEMPTIONS:

Pursuant to 36 C.F.R. § 261.50(e) the following persons are exempt from this order:

- a. Persons who are in the act of building, maintaining, attending, or using a fire, campfire, or stove fire in a Forest Service provided metal fire ring or grill in a designated site within a developed Forest Service campground, recreation area, or picnic ground. Charcoal grills, stoves, lanterns, or heating devices may be used, provided such devices meet the fire underwriter's specifications for safety.
- b. Persons with a Forest Service permit specifically authorizing the prohibited act or omission.
- c. Any Federal, State, or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in the performance of an official duty.

Violation of this prohibition is punishable as a Class B misdemeanor, by a fine of not more than \$5,000.00 for an individual, or \$10,000.00 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than six (6) months, or both. [16 U.S.C. § 551, 18 U.S.C. §§ 3559 and 3571 (b)(6)].

EXHIBIT A – BKF-100-08

South Dakota Statutes §§ 34-35-15, 34-35-16 and/or 34-35-17, Black Hills Fire Protection District.

34-35-15. Black Hills Forest Fire Protection District--Area included. To protect the timber on areas subject to unusual fire dangers, there is hereby created the Black Hills Forest Fire Protection District, consisting of all that part of the state described by metes and bounds as follows: Commencing at a point on the Wyoming-South Dakota state line at the junction of Interstate Highway 90 at the state line; thence east and southeast along Interstate Highway 90 via Rapid City to the intersection of U.S. Highway 16B; thence south and southwest along U.S. Highway 16B to the intersection of State Highway 79; thence south along State Highway 79 to the intersection of U.S. Highway 18; thence south along U.S. Highway 18 to the Cheyenne River; thence west and northwest along the Cheyenne River to the Wyoming-South Dakota state line; thence north along said state line to the place of beginning. The Black Hills Forest Fire Protection District does not include any area within the limits of any municipality.

34-35-16. Permit required for open fire in Black Hills district -- Violation as misdemeanor -- Liability for civil damages. The starting of an open fire within the Black Hills forest fire protection district by a person or a group of persons is prohibited unless a permit to do so is first obtained from the state forester or from the United States forest service supervisor. An open fire as used in this section and § 34-35-17 is any fire to burn slash, brush, grass, stubble, debris, rubbish, or other inflammable material not enclosed in a stove, sparkproof incinerator, or an established fireplace approved or constructed by public agencies in designated recreation areas. A violation of this section is a Class 1 misdemeanor. Any person who violates this section is liable for civil damages for all injuries caused by the fire.

34-35-17. Issuance of permit for open fire in Black Hills district -- Conditions required. Any United States forest service supervisor, or his designee, the state forester or his designee shall have authority to issue a permit upon an application to any person to start an open fire within the Black Hills forest fire protection district if in his opinion such fire will not endanger the life or property of another, or deny such permit if in his opinion the climatic conditions or location of the material to be burned is such that the burning would endanger the life or property of others and he may issue a permit subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may consider necessary to prevent the spread of the fire permitted; and he may revoke a permit issued by him upon the change of climatic or other conditions which he considers would make the burning unsafe.

REGIONAL ORDER
Occupancy and Use Restrictions
Rocky Mountain Region

Pursuant to Title 16 United States Code (“USC”) 551, and Title 36 Code of Federal Regulations (“CFR”) 261.50(a) and (b), the following acts are prohibited on all National Forest System lands administered as National Forests or National Grasslands within the Rocky Mountain Region (Region 2) of the United States Department of Agriculture – Forest Service in the states of Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, and/or Wyoming. This Regional Order is supplemental to and does not rescind or replace those restrictions at 36 CFR 261 Subpart A, and/or any Forest Supervisor Order issued under 36 CFR 261 Subpart B. This Regional Order is necessary to protect public health and safety and to provide the public with consistent public health and safety restrictions in the Rocky Mountain Region.

PROHIBITIONS:

1. Operating any motor vehicle on National Forest System roads in violation of applicable state, county or local government law, regulation and/or ordinance relating to the use and possession of motor vehicles. 36 CFR 261.54(d)
2. Operating a vehicle carelessly, recklessly or without regard for the rights or safety of other persons or in a manner or at a speed that would endanger or be likely to endanger any person or property on National Forest System roads. 36 CFR 261.54(f)
3. Parking or leaving a vehicle in violation of posted instructions. 36 CFR 261.58(g)
4. Using a National Forest System Road for commercial hauling without a permit or written authorization from the Forest Service. 36 CFR 261.54(c)
5. Possessing or consuming a beverage which is defined as an alcoholic beverage by applicable state law. 36 CFR 261.58(bb).
6. Possessing, storing or transporting Cannabis plant/s or part thereof or any controlled substance derived from the manufacture of Cannabis plant/s as defined or classified under 21 USC 802(16) as Marijuana. 36 CFR 261.58(t)

7. Possessing, discharging or using any kind of firework or pyrotechnic device. 36CFR 261.52(f)
8. Operating or using any internal or external combustion engine without a spark arresting device properly installed, maintained, and in effective working order, meeting either: (1) Department of Agriculture, Forest Service Standard 5100-1a (as amended); or (2) Appropriate Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) recommended practice J335(b) and J350(a). 36 CFR 261.52(j)

EXEMPTIONS:

Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this order:

1. Persons with a Forest Service permit specifically authorizing the otherwise prohibited act or omission.
2. Persons utilizing motorized vehicles to provide incidental services and supplies for holders of National Forest System inholdings, for holders of Forest Service recreational special use authorizations, and/or for authorized public services are exempt from Prohibition 4. "Incidental" is defined for the purposes of this Regional Order as the occasional delivery of fuel, food and other necessary supplies, or provision of services to the above described holders and/or authorized users.
3. Persons who have attained the age of 21 years are exempt from Prohibition 5 to the extent not otherwise restricted by applicable federal, state or local law.
4. Any Federal, State, or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in the performance of an official duty.

This Regional Order shall be in effect from December 31, 2006 until December 31, 2008, or rescinded whichever occurs first
